Question 4 – We would like to know your views on the effects that the Statements of What Matters Code would have on the Welsh language, specifically on:

- i) opportunities for people to use Welsh
- ii) treating the Welsh language no less favourably than the English language.

What effects do you think there would be? How could positive effects be increased, or negative effects be mitigated?

Supporting comments

Whilst we understand the rationale for replacing references to 'Welsh, English and International Languages' within the statements of what matters with reference to 'plurilingual', we do not agree with the proposal. We fully support the principle and importance of multilingualism, and we agree that reference to this within the curriculum is essential. Nonetheless, it is unclear why this means references to Welsh and English need to be omitted from the statements of what matters.

This is a curriculum for Wales, and as such one would expect the statement of what matters to refer to the two languages of Wales (Welsh and English), albeit within the wider context of plurilingualism/multilingualism. The rest of the curriculum reflects the fact that the two languages of Wales are given particular attention, and it would therefore be clearer and more consistent if the statement of what matters refer to Welsh and English specifically. There is also the danger by not referring to the Welsh language, that an opportunity to emphasise the bilingual nature of Wales is missed and might lead to the conclusion that English is the 'default' language of education in Wales.

Unless the statements of what matters for languages, literacy and communication refers to Welsh and English, then it is not consistent with the requirements and expectations of the curriculum. We believe that it is appropriate for the statements of what matters to refer to the aspiration of an increasing bilingual Wales, and that they reflect the fact that expectations in terms of Welsh and English are different to other languages. It is this, of course, that distinguishes this as a Welsh curriculum, as opposed to the curriculum of any other nation. We emphasise once more that referring to Welsh and English in no way undermines the principle of plurilingualism, nor its prominent place in the new curriculum.

Question 5 – Please also explain how you believe the proposed Statements of What Matters Code could be formulated or changed so as to have:
